

Safety Precautions

- Before using the product, please ensure that you read the safety precautions described below. Always ensure that the product is used correctly.
- The safety precautions noted on the following pages are intended to prevent injuries to yourself and other persons, or damage to the equipment.
- Be sure to also check the guides included with any separately sold accessories you use.



Denotes the possibility of serious injury or death.

Do not trigger the flash in close proximity to people's eyes.

Exposure to the intense light produced by the flash could damage eyesight. In particular, remain at least one meter (39 inches) away from infants when using the flash.

Store this equipment out of the reach of children and infants.

Strap: Putting the strap around a child's neck could result in asphyxiation.

- Use only recommended power sources.
- Do not attempt to disassemble, alter or apply heat to the product.
- Avoid dropping or subjecting the product to severe impacts.
- To avoid the risk of injury, do not touch the interior of the product if it has been dropped or otherwise damaged.
- Stop using the product immediately if it emits smoke, a strange smell, or otherwise behaves abnormally.

- Do not handle the power cord with wet hands.
- Do not use the equipment in a manner that exceeds the rated capacity of the electrical outlet or wiring accessories. Do not use if the power cord or plug are damaged, or not fully plugged into the outlet.
- Do not allow dirt or metal objects (such as pins or keys) to contact the terminals or plug.

The battery may explode or leak, resulting in electrical shock or fire. This could cause injury and damage the surroundings. In the event that a battery leaks and the battery acid contacts eyes, mouth, skin or clothing, immediately flush with water.

· Turn the camera off in places where camera use is prohibited.

The electromagnetic waves emitted by the camera may interfere with the operation of electronic instruments and other devices. Exercise adequate caution when using the camera in places where use of electronic devices is restricted, such as inside airplanes and medical facilities

It is possible to suffer hearing loss from listening with headphones to the loud sounds of a CD-ROM played on a music CD player. Additionally, playing the CD-ROM(s) in an audio CD player (music player) could damage the speakers.

▲ Caution

Denotes the possibility of injury.

- Be careful not to bang the camera or subject it to strong impacts or shocks when hanging it by the strap.
- Be careful not to bump or push strongly on the lens.

This could lead to injury or damage the camera.

Be careful not to subject the screen to strong impacts.

If the screen cracks, injury may result from the broken fragments.

- When using the flash, be careful not to cover it with your fingers or clothing.
 This could result in burns or damage to the flash.
- Avoid using, placing or storing the product in the following places:
 - Places subject to strong sunlight
 - Places subject to temperatures above 40 °C (104 °F)
 - Humid or dusty areas

These could cause leakage, overheating or an explosion of the battery, resulting in electrical shock, fire, burns or other injuries.

High temperatures may cause deformation of the camera or battery charger casing.

 The slideshow transition effects may cause discomfort when viewed for prolonged periods.

Caution

Denotes the possibility of damage to the equipment.

- Do not aim the camera at bright light sources (such as the sun on a clear day).
 Doing so may damage the image sensor.
- When using the camera on a beach or at a windy location, be careful not to allow dust or sand to enter the camera.

This may cause the product to malfunction.

In regular use, small amounts of smoke may be emitted from the flash.

This is due to the high intensity of the flash burning dust and foreign materials stuck to the front of the unit. Please use a cotton swab to remove dirt, dust or other foreign matter from the flash to prevent heat build-up and damage to the unit.

- Remove and store the battery when you are not using the camera.
- If the battery is left inside the camera, damage caused by leakage may occur.
- Before you discard the battery, cover the terminals with tape or other insulators.
 Contacting other metal materials may lead to fire or explosions.
- Unplug the battery charger from the power outlet after charging is complete, or when you are not using it.
- Do not place anything, such as cloth on top of the battery charger while it is charging.

Leaving the unit plugged in for a long period of time may cause it to overheat and distort, resulting in fire.

. Do not place the battery near pets.

Pets biting the battery could cause leakage, overheating or explosion, resulting in fire or damage.

Do not sit down with the camera in your pocket.

Doing so may cause malfunctions or damage the screen.

- When putting the camera in your bag, ensure that hard objects do not come into contact with the screen.
- Do not attach any hard objects to the camera.




Getting Started

This chapter explains preparations before shooting, how to shoot in mode, and then how to view and erase the images you take. The latter part of this chapter explains how to shoot and view movies and transfer images to a computer.

Attaching the Strap/Holding the Camera


- Attach the included strap and wrap it around your wrist to avoid dropping the camera during use.
- Keep your arms tight against your body while holding the camera firmly by the sides when shooting. Be sure that your fingers do not block the flash.




Charging the Battery

Use the included charger to charge the battery. Be sure to charge the battery as it is not charged at the time of purchase.










Align the
 marks on the battery and charger, then insert the battery by sliding it in (1) and down (2).



Charge the battery.

- For CB-2LV: Flip out the plug (1) and plug the charger into a power outlet (2).
- For CB-2LVE: Plug the power cord into the charger, then plug the other end into a power outlet.
- The charge lamp lights orange and charging starts.
- The charge lamp will light green when charging has finished. Charging takes approx. 1 hour and 30 minutes.



Remove the battery.

 Unplug the battery charger from the power outlet, then remove the battery by sliding it in (1) and up (2).





To protect the battery and prolong its life, do not charge it for longer than 24 hours continuously.

Using the battery and charger effectively

Charge the battery on the day, or the day before, it will be used.

Charged batteries continue to discharge naturally even if they are not used.



Attach the cover to a charged battery so that the \triangle mark is visible.

- · How to store the battery for long periods:
 - Deplete and remove the battery from the camera. Attach the terminal cover and store the battery. Storing a battery for long periods of time (about a year) without depleting it may shorten its life span or affect its performance.
- The battery charger can also be used when abroad.
- The charger can be used in regions that have 100 240 V (50/60 Hz) AC power. If the plug does not fit the outlet, use a commercially available plug adapter. Do not use electrical transformers for foreign travel as they will cause damage.
- The battery may develop a bulge.
 - This is a normal characteristic of the battery and does not indicate a problem. However, if the battery bulges to the point where it will no longer fit into the camera, please contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.
- If the battery is quickly depleted even after charging, it has reached the end of its life span. Purchase a new battery.




Check the card's write-protect tab.


If the memory card has a write-protect tab, you will not be able to record images if the tab is in the locked position. Slide the tab up until you hear a click.

Open the cover.


Slide the cover (1) and open it (2).

Inserting the Battery and Memory Card






- Press the battery lock in the direction of the arrow, then insert the battery as shown until it locks into place with a click.
- Be sure to insert the battery in the correct direction or it will not properly lock into place.



Terminals.

Insert the memory card.

- Insert the memory card as shown until it locks into place with a click.
- Be sure the memory card is oriented correctly. Inserting the memory card in the wrong direction could damage the camera.




Close the cover.


 Close the cover (1), and press downward as you slide it until it clicks into place (2).

What if [Memory card locked] appears on the screen?

SD, SDHC, SDXC memory cards, and Eye-Fi cards have a write-protect tab. If this tab is in the locked position, [Memory card locked] will appear on the screen and you will not be able to take or erase images.

Removing the Battery and Memory Card





- Open the cover and press the battery lock in the direction of the arrow.
- The battery will pop up.



Remove the memory card.

- Push the memory card in until you hear a click, then slowly release it.
- The memory card will pop up.

Setting the Date and Time

The Date/Time settings screen will appear the first time the camera is turned on. Since the dates and times recorded into your images are based on these settings, be sure to set them.









Turn on the camera.

- Press the power button.
- ▶ The Date/Time screen will appear.

Set the date and time.

- Press the buttons to choose an option.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to set a value.

Complete the setting.

- Press the (SET) button.
 - Once the date and time have been set, the Date/Time screen will close.
 - Pressing the power button will turn off the camera.

Reappearing Date/Time screen

Set the correct date and time. If you have not set the date and time, the Date/Time screen will appear each time you turn on the camera.


Daylight saving time settings

If you choose ★ in Step 2 and press the ▲ buttons to choose ★, you will set the time to daylight saving (1 hour ahead).

Changing the Date and Time

You can change the current date and time settings.






Press the MENU button.



Choose [Date/Time].

- Move the zoom lever to choose the *† tab.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [Date/ Time], then press the (button.





- Follow Steps 2 and 3 on p. 19 to adjust the setting.
- Press the MENU button to close the menu.



- The camera has a built-in date/time battery (backup battery) that allows the date/time settings to be retained for about three weeks after the battery pack has been removed.
- By inserting a charged battery or connecting an AC adapter kit (sold separately, p. 38) the date/time battery can be charged in about 4 hours even if the camera is not turned on.
- If the date/time battery is depleted, the Date/Time screen will appear when you turn the camera on. Follow the steps on p. 19 to set the date and time.

Setting the Display Language

You can change the language that displays on the screen.





Press the button.





2	Display	the	settings	screen.


 Press and hold the (st) button, then immediately press the MENU button.



Set the display language.

- Press the ▲▼◀▶ buttons to choose a language, then press the (ﷺ) button.
- Once the display language has been set, the settings screen will close.






The clock will appear if too much time passes between pressing the button and the MENU button in Step 2. If the clock appears, press the button to remove the clock and repeat Step 2.




You can also change the display language by pressing the **MENU** button to choose [Language] from the **f†** tab.

Formatting Memory Cards

Before you use a new memory card or one that has been formatted in other devices, you should format the card with this camera. Formatting (initializing) a memory card erases all data on the memory card. As you cannot retrieve the erased data, exercise adequate caution before formatting the memory card. Before formatting an Eye-Fi card (p. 179), be sure to install the software contained on the card to a computer.





Press the MFNU button



Choose [Format].


- Move the zoom lever to choose the YT tab.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [Format]. then press the (SET) button.



- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [OK]. then press the (button.
- The memory card will be formatted.



Complete formatting.

- When formatting ends, [Memory card formatting complete] will appear on the screen.
- Press the (button.

Formatting or erasing data on a memory card merely changes the file management information on the card and does not ensure its contents are completely erased. Be careful when transferring or disposing of a memory card. When disposing of a memory card, take precautions such as physically destroying the card to prevent personal information leaks.




- The total capacity of the memory card displayed in the formatting screen may be less than indicated on the memory card.
- Perform a low-level format (p. 167) of the memory card when the camera does not operate properly, the recording/reading speed of a memory card has dropped, when continuous shooting speed slows down, or when movie recording stops suddenly.

Pressing the Shutter Button

To take images that are in focus, be sure to first press the shutter button lightly (halfway) to focus, then press fully to shoot.





Press halfway (Press lightly to focus).

 Press lightly until the camera beeps twice and AF frames appear where the camera focused.

Press fully (Press fully to shoot).

- The camera plays the shutter sound and takes the shot.
- Since the shot is being taken while the shutter sound plays, be careful not to move the camera.



Does the length of the shutter sound change?


- Since the time required to shoot differs depending on the scene you want to take, the length of the shutter sound may change.
- If the camera or subject moves while the shutter sound is playing, the recorded image may be blurry.



If you shoot without pressing the shutter button halfway, the image may not be in focus.

Taking Pictures (Smart Auto)

Since the camera can determine the subject and shooting conditions, you can let it automatically select the best settings for the scene and just shoot. The camera can also detect and focus on faces, setting the color and brightness to optimal levels.





Turn on the camera.

- Press the power button.
- The start-up screen will appear.








Enter (MIO) mode.

- Set the mode switch to AUTO
- When you point the camera toward the subject, the camera will make a slight noise as it determines the scene
- The icon for the determined scene will. appear in the upper right of the screen.
- The camera will focus on detected subjects and display frames on them.












AF Frame



Compose the shot.

Moving the zoom lever toward [♠] (telephoto) will zoom in on your subject, making it appear larger. Moving the lever toward [♣] (wide angle) will zoom out from your subject, making it appear smaller. (The zoom bar showing the zoom position appears on the screen.)

Focus.

- Press the shutter button halfway to focus.
- When the camera focuses, it will beep twice and AF frames will appear where the camera focused.
 - Several AF frames will appear when the camera focuses on more than one point.

Shoot.

- Press the shutter button fully to shoot.
- ▶ The camera will play the shutter sound and shoot. The flash will automatically fire in low light conditions.
- The image will appear on the screen for approximately two seconds.
- You can take a second picture even while an image is displayed by pressing the shutter button again.



What if...

 What if the color and brightness of the images do not turn out as expected?

The scene icon (p. 187) that appears on the screen may not match the actual scene. If this happens, try shooting in **P** mode (p. 83).

• What if white and gray frames appear when you point the camera toward a subject?

A white frame appears on the face or subject that the camera detected as the main subject, while gray frames appear on other detected faces. The frames will follow the subjects within a certain range.

If the subject moves, however, the gray frames will disappear, leaving only the white frame

- What if a frame does not appear on the subject you want to shoot?
 The subject may not be detected, and frames may appear on the background.
 If this happens, try shooting in P mode (p. 83).
- What if a blue frame appears when you press the shutter button halfway?
 A blue frame appears when a moving subject is detected; the focus and exposure will continuously adjust (Servo AF).
- What if a flashing appears?
 Attach the camera to a tripod so that the camera does not move and blur the image.
- What if the camera does not play any sounds? Pressing the ▼ button while turning on the camera power will turn off all sounds. To turn the sounds on, press the MENU button to choose [Mute] from the ↑↑ tab, then press the ◆ buttons to choose [Off].
- What if the image comes out dark even if the flash fired when shooting? The subject is too far away for the flash to reach. The effective flash range is approximately 30 cm 4.0 m (12 in. 13 ft.) from the end of the lens at maximum wide angle (IIII), and approximately 50 cm 2.0 m (1.6 6.6 ft.) from the end of the lens at maximum telephoto ([$\frac{1}{2}$]).
- What if the camera beeps once when the shutter button is pressed halfway?

Your subject may be too close. When the camera is at maximum wide angle ([11]), move about 3 cm (1.2 in.) or more away from your subject and shoot. Move about 50 cm (1.6 ft.) or more away when the camera is at maximum telephoto ([1]).

- What if the lamp lights when the shutter button is pressed halfway?
 To reduce red-eye and to assist in focusing, the lamp may light when shooting in dark areas.
- What if the \$ icon blinks when you try to shoot?
 The flash is charging. You can shoot when recharging ends.



What if an icon appears in the upper right of the screen?

The icon for the determined scene will appear in the upper right of the screen. For details on the icons that appear, see "Scene Icons" (p. 187).



Choosing the subject to focus on (Tracking AF)

After pressing the ▲ button and displaying ; point the camera so that ; is on the subject you want to focus on. Press and hold the shutter button halfway to display a blue frame where focus and exposure will be maintained (Servo AF). Press the shutter button fully to shoot.

Viewing Images

You can view the images you have taken on the screen.



Enter Playback mode.

- Press the button.
- The last image you took will appear.



Choose an image.

- Pressing the ◀ button will cycle through the images from newest to oldest.
- Pressing the button will cycle through the images from oldest to newest.
- Pressing and holding the ◀▶ buttons will display images in a line letting you quickly search them. Pressing the (★) button restores single image playback (p. 118).
- The lens will retract after approximately 1 minute elapses.
- Pressing the button again while the lens is retracted will turn off the power.


Screen Display in Dark Shooting Conditions

The display automatically brightens when shooting in dark conditions, allowing you to check the composition (Night Display function). However, the brightness of the image on the screen, and the brightness of the actual image recorded may be different. Screen noise may appear and the movement of the subject may appear somewhat jagged on the screen. This has no effect on the recorded image.

Overexposure Warning during Playback

In Detailed Information Display (p. 44), overexposed areas of the image flash on the screen

Histogram during Playback



The graph that appears in Detailed Information Display (p. 188) is called the histogram. The histogram shows the distribution of brightness in an image horizontally, and the amount of brightness vertically. When the graph approaches the right side, the image is bright, but when it approaches the left side, the image is dark, and in this way you can judge the exposure.

Indicator

The indicator on the back of the camera (p. 43) will light or blink depending on the camera's status.

When the indicator blinks green, do not turn off the power, open the memory card slot/battery cover, shake or jolt the camera. These actions may corrupt the image data or cause the camera or memory card to malfunction.







Power Saving Function (Auto Power Down)

To save battery power, the screen turns off, and the camera shuts down automatically when it is not operated for a certain time.

Power Saving during Shooting

The screen will turn off approximately 1 minute after you stop operating the camera. After about 2 more minutes, the lens will retract and the power will turn off. When the screen has turned off but the lens has not yet retracted, pressing the shutter button halfway (p. 23) turns on the screen and shooting can continue.

Power Saving during Playback

The power will turn off approximately 5 minutes after you stop operating the camera.



- You can turn off the power saving function (p. 170).
- You can adjust the time before the screen turns off (p. 171).

Clock Functions

You can check the current time






Zooming in More Closely on Subjects (Digital Zoom)

You can use the digital zoom to zoom up to approximately 16x maximum, and capture subjects that are too far away for the optical zoom to enlarge. However, depending on the recording pixel setting (p. 61) and zoom factor, the images may appear coarse (the zoom factor will appear in blue).





- Hold the lever until zooming stops.
- Zooming stops at the largest possible zoom factor without image deterioration. The zoom factor will appear on the screen when you release the zoom lever.





The digital zoom will zoom in even further on the subject.

Turning off the digital zoom

To turn off the digital zoom, press the MENU button to choose [Digital Zoom] from the \bigcirc tab, then choose [Off].



The focal length when using the optical zoom and digital zoom together is approximately 28 – 448 mm, and 28 – 112 mm when using the optical zoom alone (all focal lengths are 35mm film equivalent).

Digital Tele-Converter

The focal length of the lens can be increased by approximately 1.5x or approximately 2.0x. This enables a faster shutter speed and less chance of camera shake than the zoom (including digital zoom) used by itself at the same zoom factor.

However, a recording pixel setting (p. 61) of L or M1 will cause images to appear coarse (the zoom factor will appear in blue).







Display the menu.

Press the MENU button.

Choose [Digital Zoom].

- Move the zoom lever to choose the tab.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [Digital Zoom].

Choose the setting.

- Press the buttons to choose a magnification.
- Press the MENU button to complete the setting and restore the shooting screen.
- The view will be enlarged and the zoom factor will appear on the screen.
- To return to standard digital zoom, choose [Digital Zoom] and the [Standard] option.



- The respective focal lengths when using [1.5x] and [2.0x] are approximately 42.0 – 168 mm and approximately 56.0 – 224 mm (35mm film equivalent).
- The digital tele-converter cannot be used together with the digital zoom.
- The shutter speeds may be the same when at maximum telephoto , and when zoomed in on the subject using Step 2 on p. 55.

Inserting the Date and Time

You can insert the shooting date and time in the lower right corner of an image. Once inserted, however, they cannot be deleted. Be sure to check beforehand that the date and time are correctly set (p. 19).

Choose [Date Stamp].

- Move the zoom lever to choose the tab.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [Date Stamp].

Choose the setting.

- Once set, [DATE] will appear on the screen.

Shoot.

- The shooting date or time will be recorded in the image's lower right corner.
- To restore to the original setting, choose [Off] in Step 3.

- Exposure and white balance settings are set with the first shot.
- If the flash fires or you set a high number of shots, the shooting interval may take longer than usual.
- If the memory card fills, shooting stops automatically.



When you set the delay for more than 2 seconds, the lamp and self-timer sound speed up 2 seconds before the shutter releases (the lamp remains lit when the flash will fire).

Changing the Recording Pixel Setting (Image Size)

You can choose from 4 recording pixel settings.








This chapter explains how to add effects and how to shoot in various conditions.



Shooting in Various Conditions

The camera will select the necessary settings for the conditions in which you wish to shoot when you choose the matching mode.





Set the mode switch to <a>



Choose a Shooting mode.

- After pressing the ⊕ button, press the
 ▲ buttons to choose P, then press the
 ⊕ button again.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose the desired mode, then press the (button.

Take portraits (Portrait)

 Produces a soft effect when photographing people.



Take shots of kids and pets (Kids&Pets)

- Lets you capture subjects that move around, such as children and pets, without missing photo opportunities.
- Move approximately 1 m (3.3 ft.) or more away from your subject and shoot.











☐ Take nightscapes without using a tripod (Handheld NightScene)

- Lets you take beautiful snapshots of city nightscenes by combining several continuous shots to reduce camera shake and noise
- When using a tripod, you should shoot in MID mode (p. 24).

Take shots in low light conditions (Low Light)

 Lets you take shots in dark places with reduced camera shake and subject blur.

Take shots of people at the beach (Beach)

 Lets you take shots of brightly lit people on sandy beaches where the reflected sunlight is strong.

Shoot underwater (Underwater)

- Lets you take natural-colored shots of aquatic life and underwater scenery when used with a Waterproof Case (sold separately) (p. 39).
- You can manually correct the tone (p. 87).

¼ Take shots of foliage (Foliage)

 Lets you shoot trees and leaves, such as new growth, autumn leaves or blossoms, in vivid colors.


Shooting in Various Conditions





*Take shots of people in snow (Snow)

 Lets you take bright, natural-colored shots of people against snowy backgrounds.



 Lets you take shots of fireworks in vivid colors.



- In mode, hold the camera firmly while shooting as multiple images are captured in succession.
- In mode, attach the camera to a tripod to prevent the camera from moving and blurring the image. Additionally, you should set [IS Mode] to [Off] when shooting with a tripod (p. 175).



- In $\stackrel{\text{\tiny 2a}}{=}$ mode, the recording pixel setting will be fixed at M (1984 x 1488 pixels).
- In \$\mathbb{R}\$, \$\mathbb{H}\$ or \$\sqrt{\left}\$ mode, images may appear coarse because the ISO speed (p. 88) is increased to match the shooting conditions.
- If camera shake is too strong while shooting in mode, the camera may not be able to combine images or you may not obtain the expected result depending on shooting conditions.

Making Short Movies Automatically (Movie Digest)

You can make a short movie of a day just by taking still images. Each time you take a picture, the scene just before taking your shot will be recorded as a movie. All the movies recorded that day will be saved as a single file.





Choose 3.

Follow Steps 1 – 2 on p. 64 to choose



- Press the shutter button fully to shoot a still image.
- A movie of approx. 2 − 4 sec. will be recorded just before the image is taken.



What if a movie is not recorded?

If you take a picture just after turning on the camera, selecting at mode or otherwise operating the camera, a movie may not be recorded.



Viewing movies made with Movie Digest

You can select movies made in a mode by date for viewing (p. 119).



- Since you are also shooting movies when you shoot still images, the battery will be depleted more quickly than in AUTO.
- The image quality will be fixed at M for movies shot in A mode.
- In the following cases, movies will be saved as separate files even if they were shot on the same day with A mode.
 - If the clip file size reaches 4 GB or the recording time reaches approximately 1 hour
 - If the movie is protected (p. 134)
 - If the Time Zone setting is changed (p. 171)
 - If a new folder is created (p. 170)
- · If you operate the camera while shooting a movie, the sounds made will be recorded in the movie
- · The camera will not play sounds, such as when pressing the shutter button halfway, using the controls or the self-timer (p. 166).

Adding Effects and Shooting

You can add various effects to images when shooting.



Choose a Shooting mode.

- Follow Steps 1 2 on p. 64 to choose a Shooting mode.
- Shoot.



Since you may not achieve the expected results with images shot in (2), 🖷, 🎒, 🕭 and 🔯 modes, try taking some test shots first.





Shoot images with vivid colors (Super Vivid)

 Lets you take shots with vivid, intense colors.



Take posterized shots (Poster Effect)

 Lets you take shots that look like an old poster or illustration.

Shoot with the Effects of a Fish-Eye Lens (Fisheye Effect)

Lets you shoot with the distorting effect of a fish-eye lens.



Choose <a> .

- Follow Steps 1 − 2 on p. 64 to choose
- Choose an effect level.
 - Press the MENU button for more than one second.
 - [Effect Level] will appear on the screen.
 - Press the ◀▶ buttons to choose an effect level, then press the MENU button.
 - You can check the effect on the screen.

Shoot.

Take Shots That Look Like a Miniature Model (Miniature Effect)

Blurs chosen portions in the top and bottom of an image to produce the effect of a miniature model.



Choose &.

- Follow Steps 1 2 on p. 64 to choose ▲.
- A white frame (the area that will not be blurred) appears on the screen.



Choose the area to keep in focus.

- Press the MENU button for more than one second.
- Move the zoom lever to change the frame size, and press the ▲▼ buttons to change the frame position, then press the MENU button.





- If you press the ◀▶ buttons in Step 2, the frame will switch to vertical orientation, and you can change the area to focus in by pressing the ◀▶ buttons again. Press the ▲▼ buttons will return the frame to horizontal orientation.
- · Holding the camera vertically will change the orientation of the frame.
- Be sure to set a playback speed before shooting a Miniature Effect movie (p. 109).

Changing the Color and Shooting

You can change the look of an image when shooting. However, depending on shooting conditions, the image may become coarse, or the colors may not come out as expected.

Color Accent

You can choose to retain a single color and change the rest to black and white in a composition.





Follow Steps 1 − 2 on p. 64 to choose f_A.

Press the MENU button for more than one second.

- The unchanged image and the Color Accent image will alternately display.
- The color for default settings is green.

Specify the color.

- Position the center frame so it is filled with the color you want and press the ◀ button.
- ▶ The specified color will be recorded.



- Press the ▲▼ buttons to change the range of colors to be retained.
- Choose a negative value to limit the range of colors. Choose a positive value to extend the range of colors to similar colors.
- Press the MENU button to complete the setting and restore the shooting screen.



Recorded color



Using the flash may cause unexpected results in this mode.

Color Swap

You can swap one color in an image for another when recording it. You can only swap one color.





Follow Steps 1 – 2 on p. 64 to choose √s.



Press the MENU button for more than one second.

- ➤ The unchanged image and the Color Swap image will alternately display.
- The default setting is to change green to gray.



Specify the color to be swapped.

- The specified color will be recorded.

Specify the range of colors to be swapped.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to adjust the range of colors to be changed.
- Choose a negative value to limit the range of colors. Choose a positive value to extend the range of colors to similar colors.
- Press the MENU button to complete the setting and restore the shooting screen.



- Using the flash may cause unexpected results in this mode.
- Under some conditions, the image may appear coarse.

Shooting in Monochrome

You can shoot images in black and white, sepia or blue and white.

- [Color Tone] will appear on the screen.
- Press the ◀▶ buttons to choose an effect, then press the MENU button.
- You can check the color tone on the screen.

Shoot with the Effects of a Toy Camera (Toy Camera Effect)

This effect darkens and blurs the corners of the image, and changes the overall color so that it looks like an image shot with a toy camera.

Choose a color tone.

- Press the MENU button for more than one second.
- Press the ◆▶ buttons to choose an effect, then press the MENU button.
 You can check the color on the screen
- Shoot.

Standard Images will look like they were shot with a toy camera.	
Warm	Gives images a warmer tone than [Standard].
Cool	Gives images a cooler tone than [Standard].

Detecting a Face and Shooting (Smart Shutter)

Detecting a Smile and Shooting

The camera will shoot, even without pressing the shutter button, when it detects a smile.





Choose (L).

- Follow Steps 1 − 2 on p. 64 to choose then press the MENU button for more than one second
- Press the buttons to choose î, then press the MENU button.
- The camera will enter shooting stand-by, and [Smile Detection on] will appear on the screen.





Point the camera at a person.

- Fach time the camera detects a smile it will. shoot after the lamp lights.
- Press the ▼ button to pause smile detection. Press the ▼ button again to resume smile detection.



What if a smile is not detected?

Smiles are easier to detect if the subject faces the camera, and opens their mouth enough to show some teeth when smiling.



Changing the number of shots

After choosing 🕒 in Step 1, press the ▲▼ buttons.



- You should switch to another mode when you finish shooting, or the camera will continue taking shots each time the camera detects a smile.
- You can also shoot by pressing the shutter button.

Using the Wink Self-Timer

Point the camera at a person and press the shutter button fully. The camera will shoot approximately two seconds after it detects a wink.



¶ Choose ☼.

- Press the ♠ buttons to choose ☼, then press the MENU button.

Compose the shot and press the shutter button halfway.

 Confirm that a green frame appears around the face of the person who will wink.



Press the shutter button fully.

- The camera will enter shooting stand-by, and [Wink to take picture] will appear on the screen.
- The lamp will blink and the self-timer sound will play.



Face the camera and wink.

- The shutter will release approximately 2 seconds after a wink is detected from the person inside the frame.
- To cancel the countdown, press the MENU button.

•

What if a wink is not detected?

- Wink a bit slowly.
- A wink may not be detected if eyes are covered by hair or a hat, or when wearing glasses.



Changing the number of shots

After choosing 😘 in Step 1, press the ▲▼ buttons.



- · Shutting both eyes will also be detected as a wink.
- If a wink is not detected, the shutter will release approximately 15 seconds later.
- If there are no people in the shot when the shutter button is pressed fully, the camera will shoot after a person enters the shot and winks.

Using the Face Self-Timer

The shutter will release approximately two seconds after the camera detects a new face (p. 95). You can use this when the photographer wants to be in the image, such as a group photo.





- Press the ◀▶ buttons to choose ☼, then press the MENU button.

Compose the shot and press the shutter button halfway.

 Make sure a green frame appears on the face focused on and white frames appear on other faces.



Press the shutter button fully.

- The camera will enter shooting stand-by, and [Look straight at camera to start count down] will appear on the screen.
- The lamp will blink and the self-timer sound will play.

Detecting a Face and Shooting (Smart Shutter)



Join the subjects and look at the camera.

- When the camera detects a new face, the lamp and self-timer sound will speed up (the lamp remains lit when the flash will fire), and two seconds later the shutter will release.
- To cancel shooting with the timer after countdown has started, press the MENU button.



Changing the number of shots

After choosing 😲 in Step 1, press the ▲▼ buttons.



Even if your face is not detected after joining the subjects, the shutter will release approximately 15 seconds later.

Shooting Long Exposures

You can set the shutter speed to a range between 1 and 15 seconds to shoot long exposures. However, you should attach the camera to a tripod to prevent the camera from moving and blurring the image.





Follow Steps 1 – 2 on p. 64 to choose ★3.



Choose the shutter speed.

- Press the ▲ button.
- Press the ◀▶ buttons to choose the shutter speed, then press the (♣) button.

Confirm the exposure.

 When you press the shutter button halfway, the exposure for the chosen shutter speed will appear on the screen.



- The brightness of the image may differ from the brightness of the screen in Step 3 when the shutter button was pressed halfway.
- When shutter speeds of 1.3 seconds or slower are used, images are
 processed to eliminate noise after being taken. A certain amount of
 processing time may be needed before you can take the next shot.
- You should set the [IS Mode] to [Off] when shooting with a tripod (p. 175).



If the flash fires, the image may be overexposed. If this happens, set the flash to (3) and shoot.

High-Speed Continuous Shooting (High-speed Burst)

You can shoot continuously at a maximum speed of approximately 8.2 images/second while the shutter button is pressed fully and held.





Follow Steps 1 – 2 on p. 64 to choose [□]/₂



As long as you hold the shutter button down, the camera will shoot successive images.



- The focus, brightness and white balance will be set with the first shot.
- Depending on the shooting conditions, camera settings and the zoom position, the camera may stop shooting momentarily, or the shooting speed may slow down.
- As the number of images increases, the shooting speed may slow down.

Images Displayed During Playback

Since each set of continuous images will become a single group, only the first image captured in that group will be displayed. To indicate that the image is part of a group, silve will appear in the upper left of the screen.



If you erase a grouped image (p. 138), all the images in the group will also be erased. Be sure to exercise adequate caution.



- If you want to play back images individually (p. 126), grouping can be canceled (p. 127).
- Protecting (p. 134) a grouped image, will protect all of the images in the group.
- If you play back grouped images using Filtered Playback (p. 120) or Smart Shuffle (p. 128), grouping is temporarily canceled and images are played back individually.
- Grouped images cannot be tagged as favorites (p. 140), edited (pp. 145 150), categorized (p. 142), printed (p. 152) or have the number of copies to be printed set (p. 161).
 Play back grouped images individually (p. 126), or cancel grouping

(p. 127) before trying the above.

Capturing the Best Facial Expressions (Best Image Selection)

The camera takes 5 continuous shots, then detects various aspects of the shot such as facial expressions, and saves only one picture detected as the best.





Follow Steps 1 – 2 on p. 64 to choose ☆.

Shoot.

When the shutter button is pressed fully, the camera takes five continuous shots, and saves one picture only.



- The recording pixel setting will be fixed at M (1984 x 1488 pixels).
- The focus, brightness and white balance will be set with the first shot.
- Depending on the shooting conditions, you may not obtain the expected results.

Shooting Stitch Assist Images

Large subjects can be split into several shots that can later be merged together using the included software on a computer to create a panoramic image.



Choose 🖳 or 🖳



Take the first shot.

The exposure and white balance will be set with the first shot.



Helps with the creation of panoramic images

Take subsequent shots.

- Overlap part of the first shot when taking the second shot.
- Minor discrepancies in the overlapping portions will be corrected when the images are merged.
- Up to 26 shots can be recorded with the same procedures.

This function is not available when a TV is used as a display (p. 105).

Choosing Settings Yourself

In this chapter you will learn how to use the various functions in **P** mode to progressively advance your shooting skills.



- This chapter assumes that you have set the mode switch to and the camera is in P mode.
- P stands for Program AE.
- Before attempting to shoot using a function explained in this chapter in modes other than P mode, check if the function is available in those modes (pp. 190 – 197).
- "Manually Correcting the White Balance" (p. 87) assumes that the camera is in ¼ mode.

Shooting in Program AE

You can choose the settings for various functions to suit your preferences. AE stands for Auto Exposure.

The focusing range is approximately 5 cm (2.0 in.) – infinity at maximum wide angle ((1.6 ft.)), and approximately 50 cm (1.6 ft.) – infinity at maximum telephoto ((1.6 ft.)).



- Enter P mode.
 - Follow Steps 1 2 on p. 64 to choose P.
- Adjust the settings according to your purposes (pp. 85 105).
- Shoot.



What if the shutter speed and aperture value appear in orange?

If a correct exposure cannot be obtained when pressing the shutter button halfway, the shutter speed and aperture value appear in orange. Try the following settings to obtain the correct exposure.

- Turn on the flash (p. 85)
- Choose a higher ISO speed (p. 88)

Adjusting the Brightness (Exposure Compensation)

You can adjust the standard exposure set by the camera in 1/3-stop increments in the range of -2 to +2.



Enter Exposure Compensation mode.

- Press the A button.
- Adjust the brightness.
 - While watching the screen, press the ◀▶ buttons to adjust the brightness, then press the (♠) button.
 - The exposure compensation amount will appear on the screen.

Turning the Flash On

You can make the flash fire every time you shoot.

The effective flash range is approximately 30 cm - 4.0 m (12 in. - 13 ft.) at maximum wide angle ($\boxed{\blacksquare}$), and approximately 50 cm - 2.0 m (1.6 - 6.6 ft.) at maximum telephoto (($\boxed{\blacksquare}$)).





Adjusting the White Balance

The white balance (WB) function sets the optimal white balance for natural looking colors to match the shooting conditions.





After pressing the button, press the buttons to choose ₩B, then press the button again.

Choose an option.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose an option, then press the ⊕ button.
- The setting will appear on the screen.

AWB Auto	Automatically sets the optimal white balance for the shooting conditions.
Day Light	For shooting outdoors, in fine weather conditions.
Cloudy	For shooting in cloudy, shady or twilight conditions.
	For shooting under tungsten and bulb-type (3-wavelength) fluorescent lighting.
Fluorescent	For shooting under warm-white fluorescent, cool-white fluorescent and warm-white-type (3-wavelength) fluorescent lighting.
₩ Fluorescent H	For shooting under daylight fluorescent and daylight-type (3-wavelength) fluorescent lighting.
Custom	For manually setting a custom white balance.

Custom White Balance

You can adjust the white balance to match the light source at the shooting location. Make sure that you set the white balance under the light source of the actual scene you will shoot.



- In Step 2 above, choose
- Make sure the entire screen is filled with a plain, white colored subject, then press the MENU button.
- The tint on the screen will change when white balance data is set.



If you change camera settings after recording white balance data, the tone may not turn out properly.

Manually Correcting the White Balance

You can manually correct the white balance when in in mode (p. 65). This adjustment will have the same effect as using a commercially-available color compensating filter.

Follow Steps 1 − 2 on p. 64 to choose



Choose the White Balance.

After pressing the ∰ button, press the

Adjust the setting.

- Move the zoom lever and adjust the correction amount, B or A.

- B stands for blue and A for amber.
- You can also manually correct the white balance by recording custom white balance data (p. 86) and then following the steps above.
- Even if you change the white balance setting in Step 2 after making adjustments in the correction level, those adjustments will be retained.
 However, the adjustments will be reset if custom white balance data is recorded.

Changing the ISO speed

- Lowering the ISO speed results in sharper images, but there may be an increased chance of image blurring in certain shooting conditions.
- Raising the ISO speed results in a faster shutter speed, reducing image blurring and letting the flash reach greater distances to the subject. The images, however, will appear coarse.



When the camera is set to $\frac{150}{100}$, you can press the shutter button halfway to display the automatically set ISO speed.

Correcting the Brightness and Shooting (i-Contrast)

The camera can detect areas in the scene, such as faces or backgrounds, that are too bright or dark and automatically adjust them to the optimum brightness when shooting. Also, when the overall image is lacking in contrast, the camera will automatically correct the image for a sharper impression when shooting.



Choose [i-Contrast].

- Press the MENU button to choose [i-Contrast] from the tab, then press the buttons to choose [Auto].
- ▶ Once set, C₁ will appear on the screen.



- Under some conditions, the image may appear coarse or may not be corrected properly.
- You can correct recorded images (p. 149).

Changing the Aspect Ratio

You can change the width to height ratio of an image.





Choose 43.

 After pressing the (sir) button, press the ▲▼ buttons to choose 4:3, then press the (button again.



Choose an option.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose a option. then press the (SII) button.
- Once set, the aspect ratio of the screen will change.
- The same aspect ratio as HD TVs, used for displaying on wide-screen HD TVs. 16:9
- The same aspect ratio as 35mm film, used for printing out 5 x 7 in. or postcard 3:2 sized images.
- The same aspect ratio as the screen of this camera, used for printing images on 4:3 3.5 x 5 in. to various A-sized papers.
- **1:1** A square-shaped aspect ratio.



The digital zoom (p. 55) is only available in 43.

- Cannot be used with the self-timer (pp. 58, 59).
- Continuous shooting speed increases in the mode (p. 65).
- For continuous shooting, the focus and exposure are locked when the shutter button is pressed halfway.
- Depending on the shooting conditions and the camera settings, the camera may stop shooting momentarily, or the shooting speed may slow down.
- As the number of images increases, the shooting speed may slow down.
- · If the flash fires, the shooting speed may slow down.

Changing the Tone of an Image (My Colors)

You can change the tone of an image, for example to sepia or black and white, when shooting.

Custom Color

The contrast, sharpness, color saturation, red, green, blue, and skin tones in an image can be chosen and set at 5 different levels.



- \bullet Follow Step 2 on p. 92 to choose $\pounds_{\mathbb{C}}$, then press the MENU button.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose an option, then press the ◀▶ buttons to choose a value.
- The more to the right, the stronger/darker (skin tone) the effect gets, the more to the left, the weaker/lighter (skin tone) the effect gets.
- Press the MENU button to complete the setting.

Shooting Close-ups (Macro)

You can shoot an object at a close distance or even shoot extreme close-ups of it. The focusing range is approximately 3 - 50 cm (1.2 in. - 1.6 ft.) from the end of the lens at maximum wide angle ($|\overline{\bullet\bullet\bullet}|$).

- After pressing the ◀ button, press the ⋪ buttons to choose ⋪, then press the ⊕ button.
- Once set, will appear on the screen.



The edges of the image may darken if the flash fires.



How can I take better close-ups?

In macro shooting, try attaching the camera to a tripod and shooting in \bigcirc to prevent the camera from moving and blurring the image (p. 59).



will turn gray in the area that displays in the yellow bar underneath the zoom bar, and the camera will not focus.

Shooting Far Away Subjects (Infinity)

When it is difficult to focus because your shot contains subjects that are both near and far, you can change the focusing range to focus more reliably on far away subjects (approx. 3 m (9.8 ft.) or more from the camera) only.



Choose ▲.

- After pressing the ◀ button, press the ◀buttons to choose ▲, then press the ⊕button.
- ▶ Once set, ▲ will appear on the screen.

Changing the AF Frame Mode

You can change the AF (Auto Focus) frame mode to match the scene you want to shoot.



Choose [AF Frame].

 Press the MENU button to choose [AF Frame] from the tab, then press the buttons to choose an option.

Face AiAF

- Detects people's faces and sets the focus, exposure (evaluative metering only) and white balance (IWB only).
- When the camera is pointed at subjects, a white frame appears on the face the camera judges to be the main subject, and gray frames (max. 2) will appear on other faces.
- A frame will follow a moving subject within a certain range.
- When the shutter button is pressed halfway, up to 9 green frames will appear on faces that the camera focuses on.



- If a face is not detected and only gray frames (no white frame) appear, up to 9 green frames will appear on the areas the camera focuses on when the shutter button is pressed halfway.
- If a face is not detected when Servo AF (p. 100) is set to [On], the AF frame will appear in the center of the screen when you press the shutter button halfway.
- · Examples of faces that cannot be detected:
 - Subjects that are far away or extremely close
 - Subjects that are dark or light
- Faces turned to the side or at an angle, or faces with a portion hidden
- The camera may mistakenly identify non-human subjects as a face.
- If the camera cannot focus when you press the shutter button halfway, the AF frame will not appear.

Tracking AF

You can choose the subject you want to focus on and shoot (p. 97).

Center

The AF frame is locked to the center. This is effective for focusing on a specific point.



You can reduce the AF frame size

- Press the MENU button to choose [AF Frame Size] from the tab, then choose [Small].
- The AF frame is set to [Normal] when using the digital zoom (p. 55) or digital tele-converter (p. 56).



If the camera cannot focus when you press the shutter button halfway, the AF frame will turn yellow and \bigcirc will appear.

Changing the Composition with the Focus Lock

While you keep the shutter button pressed halfway, the focus and exposure are locked. You can now recompose and shoot. This is called Focus Lock.







- Center the subject you want in focus, and press the shutter button halfway.
- Confirm that the AF frame on the subject is green.

Shoot.

- Press the shutter button halfway. ^[---]/₂ will change into a blue ____ which will follow the subject while the camera continues to adjust the focus and exposure (Servo AF) (p. 100).
- Press the shutter button fully to shoot.
- Even after shooting completes, ^{σ-π} will appear, and the camera will continue to track the subject.



- Servo AF (p. 100) is fixed to [On].
- The camera may not be able to track the subject if the subject is too small, moves too quickly or if the contrast between the subject and the background is too low.
- Not available in \$\mathbb{W}\$ or \$\mathbb{A}\$.

Magnifying the Focal Point

If you press the shutter button halfway, the AF frame will magnify and you can check the focus.





Press the MENU button to choose [AF-Point Zoom] from the tab, then press the buttons to choose [On].



Check the focus.

- Press the shutter button halfway.
- In [Face AiAF] (p. 95), the face detected as the main subject will appear magnified.
- In [Center] (p. 96), the contents of the center AF frame will appear magnified.



What if the display does not magnify?

The display will not appear magnified in [Face AiAF] if a face cannot be detected or is too big in relation to the screen. In [Center], it will not appear magnified if the camera cannot focus.



The magnified display will not appear when using the digital zoom (p. 55), digital tele-converter (p. 56), Tracking AF (p. 97), Servo AF (p. 100) or when using a TV as a display (p. 105).

Shooting with the AF Lock

The focus can be locked. After locking the focus, the focal distance will not change even when you release your finger from the shutter button.



This chapter serves as a more advanced version of the "Shooting Movies" and "Viewing Movies" sections in Chapter 1, and explains how to use various functions for shooting and viewing movies.

Shooting Various Kinds of Movies

Just as with still images, you can let the camera select the best settings for the scene or add various effects while shooting movies.



- If you press the ◆ buttons in Step 2, the frame will switch to vertical orientation, and you can change the area to focus in by pressing the ◆ buttons again. Pressing the ◆ buttons will return the frame to horizontal orientation.
- Holding the camera vertically will change the orientation of the frame.
- Since you may not achieve the expected results depending on the shooting conditions, try taking some test shots first.

You can shoot fast moving subjects and play them back in slow motion. Audio will not be recorded.

- When editing movies, you should use a fully charged battery, or an AC adapter kit (sold separately) (p. 38).



Using Various Playback and Editing Functions



Filtered playback

In filtered playback (Step 3), you can view filtered images with "Quickly Searching Images" (p. 118), "Viewing Slideshows" (p. 122), and "Magnifying Images" (p. 125). You can process all filtered images at once while performing operations in "Protecting Images" (p. 134), "Erasing Images" (p. 138), or "Printing from the Print List (DPOF)" (p. 159), by choosing all of the filtered images.

However, if you change the category (p. 142), or edit an image and save it as a new image (p. 146), a message will appear, and filtered playback will cancel.

Viewing Slideshows

You can automatically play back images recorded to a memory card. Each image displays for approximately 3 seconds.





Group playback

In group playback (Step 3 above), you can use the FUNC. menu functions that appear when you press the () button, as well as search (p. 118) and magnify (p. 125) images. You can process all the images in a group at once while performing operations in "Protecting Images" (p. 134), "Erasing All Images" (p. 138), or "Printing from the Print List (DPOF)" (p. 159), by choosing a set of grouped images.

You can choose from 4 levels of correction, and save the image as a new file.

When you choose an item in the FUNC. menu (p. 46) or MENU (p. 47), a description of the function (hints and tips) is displayed. You can turn off this function.



 Choose [Hints & Tips], then press the buttons to choose [Off].

Low Level Memory Card Formatting

Perform low level formatting when [Memory card error] appears, the camera does not operate properly, you think that the recording/reading speed of a memory card has dropped, or recording suddenly stops while shooting a movie. As you cannot retrieve the erased data, exercise adequate caution before formatting the memory card.





Choose [Low Level Format].

- Choose [Format], then press the whiten.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [Low Level Format], then press the ◀▶ buttons to display ✔.
- Press the ▲▼◆ buttons to choose [OK], then press the (button.

Start the low level format.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [OK], then press the (button.
- Low level formatting starts.
- When low level formatting ends, [Memory card formatting complete] will appear on the screen.

Complete the low level format.

Press the (SEE) button.



- Low level formatting may take longer than standard formatting (p. 22), since all recorded data is erased.
- You can stop a low level format of a memory card by choosing [Stop].
 When stopping low level formatting, the data will be erased but the memory card can be used without problem.

Auto Reset

If you replace the memory card with a new one, or a new folder is created, file numbering begins with 0001 again.

- Refer to the Software Guide for information regarding folder structure or image types.

Creating Folders by Shooting Date

Images are saved into folders created each month, however, you can also create folders by shooting date.

Changing the Lens Retract Time

For safety reasons, the lens retracts about 1 minute after pressing the button when in a Shooting mode (p. 27). If you want the lens to retract immediately when you press the button, set the retract time to [0 sec.].

Turning Off the Power Saving Function

You can set the power saving function (p. 52) to [Off]. Setting it to [On] is recommended to save battery power.



- Choose [Power Saving], then press the (str) button.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to choose [Auto Power Down], then press the ◀▶ buttons to choose [Off].
- If you set the power saving function to [Off], be sure to turn the camera off after use.

Setting the Screen Shut-Off Time

You can adjust the time the screen takes to shut off automatically (p. 52). This also works when [Auto Power Down] is set to [Off].

Using an Eye-Fi Card

Before using an Eye-Fi card, be sure to check whether Eye-Fi card use is authorized in the country or territory of use (p. 16).

When you put a prepared Eye-Fi card into the camera, you can automatically transfer your images wirelessly to a computer, or upload them to a web service.

Image transfer is a function of the Eye-Fi card. For details on how to setup and use the card, and concerning problems transferring images, please refer to the Eye-Fi card user guide, or contact the manufacturer.



Please keep the following things in mind when using an Eye-Fi card.

- Even if you set [Eye-Fi trans.] to [Disable] (p. 180), the Eye-Fi card may transmit radio waves. Be sure to remove the Eye-Fi card from the camera before entering areas that prevent unauthorized transmission of radio waves, such as hospitals and airolanes.
- If you have trouble transferring images, check the card or computer settings.
 For details, refer to the user quide supplied with the card.
- Depending on the connection status of the wireless network, it may take time to transfer images, or image transfer may be interrupted.
- Due to its transfer function, the Eve-Fi card may become hot.
- Battery consumption will be guicker than in normal use.
- Camera operations will be slower than in normal use. This may be resolved by setting [Eye-Fi trans.] to [Disable].

If you put an Eye-Fi card into the camera, the connection status can be checked in the shooting screen (information display) and playback screen (simple information display).

What if [Eye-Fi Settings] does not appear?

[Eye-Fi Settings] will only appear when an Eye-Fi card is inserted in the camera.



If the Eye-Fi card has a write-protect tab, you will not be able to check the card's connection status, or set [Eye-Fi trans.] to [Disable] when the tab is in the locked position.

Troubleshooting

If you think there is a problem with the camera, first check the following. If the items below do not solve your problem, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk as listed on the included customer support list.

Power

You pressed the power button, but nothing happened.

- Confirm that the battery is the correct type, and is not depleted (p. 15).
- Confirm that the battery is properly inserted (p. 17).
- Confirm that the memory card/battery cover is securely closed (p. 17).
- If the battery terminals are dirty, battery performance will decrease. Clean the terminals with a cotton swab and re-insert the battery several times.

Battery is consumed quickly.

 Battery performance decreases at low temperatures. Warm the battery, for example, by placing it in your pocket with the terminal cover on.

Lens will not retract.

 Do not open the memory card/battery cover while the power is on. After closing the memory card/battery cover, turn the power on then back off (p. 17).

TV Output

Image is distorted or not showing on TV (p. 130).

Shooting

Cannot shoot.

When in Playback mode (p. 21), press the shutter button halfway (p. 23).

Screen does not display properly in dark places (p. 45).

Screen does not display properly while shooting.

Please note, the following will not be recorded in still images, but will be recorded in movies.

 When shooting under fluorescent or LED lighting, the screen may flicker, and a horizontal bar may appear.

A flashing \$\frac{1}{2}\$ appears on the screen and the shot cannot be taken even though the shutter button was pressed fully (p. 26).

appears when the shutter button is pressed halfway (p. 54).

- Set the [IS mode] to [Continuous] (p. 175).
- Set the flash to \$ (p. 85).
- Increase the ISO speed (p. 88).
- Attach the camera to a tripod. Additionally, you should set the [IS Mode] to [Off] when shooting with a tripod (p. 175).

Image is blurred.

- Press the shutter button halfway to focus on the subject, then press fully to shoot (p. 23).
- Shoot the subject within the focusing distance (p. 202).
- Set the [AF-assist Beam] to [On] (p. 173).
- Confirm that functions which you do not intend to use (macro, etc.) are not set.

Troubleshooting

Shoot using the focus lock or AF lock (pp. 96, 99).

Even when you press the shutter button halfway, the AF frame does not appear, and the camera does not focus.

 If you center on the light and dark contrasting area of the subject and push the shutter button halfway, or repeatedly push the shutter button halfway, the AF frame will appear and the camera will focus.

Subject is too dark.

- Set the flash to \$ (p. 85).
- Correct the brightness with exposure compensation (p. 85).
- Adjust the image with i-Contrast (pp. 89, 149).
- Use spot metering or AE Lock to shoot (pp. 101, 102).

Subject is too bright (overexposed).

- Set the flash to (§) (p. 54).
 Correct the brightness with exposure compensation (p. 85).
- Use spot metering or AE Lock to shoot (pp. 101, 102).
- · Reduce the light illuminating the subject.

Image is dark even though the flash fired (p. 26).

- Shoot within an appropriate distance for flash photography (p. 85).
- Increase the ISO speed (p. 88).

Image taken using the flash is too bright (overexposed).

- Shoot within an appropriate distance for flash photography (p. 85).
- Set the flash to (9, 54).

White dots appear on the image when shooting with the flash.

Light from the flash has reflected off dust particles or other objects in the air.

Image appears rough or grainy.

- Shoot with the ISO speed on a lower setting (p. 88).
- Depending on the Shooting mode, when shooting in a high ISO speed the image may appear rough or grainy (pp. 65, 66).

Eyes appear red (p. 104).

- Set the [Red-Eye Lamp] to [On] (p. 173). When shooting with the flash, the lamp (on the front of the camera) lights (p. 42), and for approximately 1 second while the camera is reducing red-eye, it is not possible to shoot. It is more effective if the subject is looking directly at the lamp. Even better results can be obtained by increasing the lighting in indoor settings or approaching closer to the subject.
- · Correct images with red-eye correction (p. 150).

Recording images to the memory card takes a long time, or continuous shooting slows down.

Perform a low-level format of the memory card in the camera (p. 167).

Cannot make settings for shooting functions or FUNC. menu.

 The items in which settings can be made differ depending on the shooting mode. Refer to "Functions Available in Each Shooting Mode" and "Shooting Menu" (pp. 190 – 197).

Shooting Movies

Correct shooting time does not display, or stops.

 Format the memory card in the camera, or use a memory card capable of recording at high speeds. Even when the shooting time does not display properly, the recorded video will be the length that it was actually shot (pp. 22, 30).

appeared on the screen and shooting ended automatically.

The camera's internal memory was insufficient. Try one of the following:

- Perform a low-level format of the memory card in the camera (p. 167).
- Change the image quality setting (p. 112).
- Use a memory card capable of recording at high speeds (p. 112).

Zoom does not operate (p. 113).

Subject appears distorted.

 The subject may appear distorted if it passes quickly in front of the camera while shooting.

Playback

Cannot play back images or movies.

If the file name or folder structure is changed on a computer, you may not be able to play back images or movies. Refer to the Software Guide for information regarding folder structure or file names.

Playback stops, or audio cuts out.

- Use a memory card that has had a low-level format performed on it with this camera (p. 167).
- If you copy a movie to a memory card that reads slowly, playback may interrupt momentarily.
- Depending on its capabilities, when playing movies on a computer, frames may drop or the audio may cut out.

Computer

Cannot transfer images to a computer.

It may be possible to solve the problem when the camera is connected to a computer via cable by reducing the transfer speed.

Press the
 In button to enter Playback mode. Then press and hold the MENU button and press the
 and
 buttons together. In the screen that appears, press the
 buttons to choose [B] and press the
 button.

Eye-Fi Card

Cannot transfer images (p. 179).

List of Messages That Appear on the Screen

If error messages appear on the screen, try one of the following solutions.

No memory card

 The memory card is not installed in the correct direction. Install the memory card in the correct direction (p. 17).

Memory card locked

 The SD memory card, SDHC memory card, SDXC memory card or Eye-Fi card's write protect tab is set to "LOCK". Unlock the write protect tab (p. 16).

Cannot record!

 You attempted to shoot an image without a memory card. Install the memory card in the correct direction to shoot (p. 17).

Memory card error (p. 167)

 If the same message appears even when a formatted memory card is installed in the correct direction, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk (p. 17).

Insufficient space on card

There is not enough free space on the memory card to shoot (pp. 24, 29, 53, 83, 107) or edit images (pp. 146 – 150). Erase the images (pp. 28, 138) to open space for new images, or insert an empty memory card (p. 16).

Change the battery pack. (p. 16)

No Image.

There are no images recorded on the memory card that can be displayed.

Protected! (p. 134)

Unidentified Image/Incompatible JPEG/Image too large./Cannot play back AVI/RAW

- Unsupported images, or images with corrupted data cannot be displayed.
- Images manipulated on a computer, that have had their file name changed, or have been taken with a different camera may not display.

Cannot magnify!/Cannot play back this content in Smart Shuffle/Cannot rotate/Cannot modify image/Cannot register this image!/Cannot modify/Cannot assign to category/Unselectable image.

- Incompatible images cannot be magnified (p. 125), played back in Smart Shuffle (p. 128), tagged as favorites (p. 140), rotated (p. 145), edited (pp. 146 – 150), registered to the start-up screen (p. 168), categorized (p. 142), or added to a print list (p. 159).
- · Grouped images cannot be processed (p. 80).
- Images manipulated on a computer, that have had their file name changed, or have been taken with a different camera may not be magnified, played back in Smart Shuffle, tagged as favorites, rotated, edited, registered to the start-up screen, categorized, or added to a print list.
- Movies cannot be magnified (p. 125), played back in Smart Shuffle (p. 128), edited (pp. 146 – 150), added to a print list (p. 159), or registered to the start-up screen (p. 168).

Invalid selection range

 When choosing the selection range (pp. 136, 139, 144, 162), you tried to choose a starting image that was after the last image or you tried to choose an ending image that was before the starting image.

Exceeded selection limit

- You chose more than 998 images in print settings. Choose less than 998 images (p. 161).
- Print settings could not be saved correctly. Reduce the number of selected images and try again (p. 161).
- You chose 501 or more images in Protect (p. 134), Erase (p. 138), Favorites (p. 140), My Category (p. 142) or Print Settings (p. 159).

Communication error

 Images could not be transferred to the computer or printed due to the large amount of images (approx. 1000) stored on the memory card. Use a commercially available USB card reader to transfer the images. Insert the memory card into the printer's card slot to print.

Naming error!

• The folder or image could not be created because there is an image with the same file name as the folder or image that the camera is attempting to create, or the highest possible file number has already been reached. In the f1 menu, change [File Numbering] to [Auto Reset] (p. 169) or format the memory card (p. 22).

Lens Error

- This error can occur if you hold the lens while it is in motion or when using it in a location with excessive dust or sand in the air.
- If this error message continues to appear, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk as there may be a problem with the lens.

A camera error was detected (Error number)

- If an error code appears directly after taking a picture, the shot may not have been recorded. Check the image in Playback mode.
- If this error code reappears, note the Error number (Exx) and contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk as there may be a problem with the camera.

File Error

 Photos from other cameras or images that have been altered using computer software may not be printable.

Print error


